



HOW TO INSTALL PURSE FEET

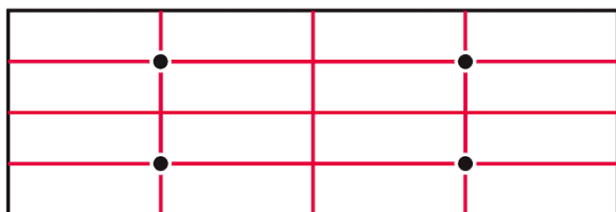
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Adding purse feet is a simple way to add a professional finish to your next bag creation. They help prevent the bottom of your bag from getting dirty and they add stability to the bottom of your bag.

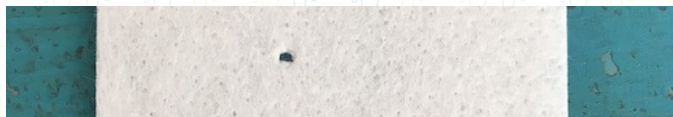
Where to install them on the bottom of your bag is a personal thing. I like to have them more to the center of the bag. Others will tell you to add them at a fixed width from the sides of your bottom. That is not important for this little tutorial.

What you will need to do is make a hole in your bottom fabric. So be very careful as to where to place them. Measure twice punch once.

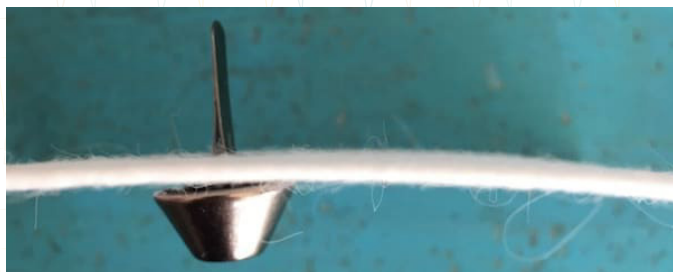
This is the place where I place my purse feet.



Use an awl, seam ripper or hole punch to cut a small slit or hole through all layers just big enough for the prongs.



Push both prongs all the way through the fabric and the inner base.



Open up the prongs in opposite directions to hold the foot in place



Because you do not want to feel the bag feet prongs through the lining of your bag, fuse a small scrap of fusible fleece on top of the fitted feet. This will also prevent your lining from wear.



No fusible fleece? Add a piece of Duck tape on top of the prongs. That will prevent your lining from wear as well.



Consider adding this finishing touch to your next bag to give it that little extra something that sets it apart.
